

Applications have been reviewed by the committee and permits have been issued to Farlow's Recycling. Mr. Farlow announced he was pleased with the committee's quick approvals and plans to have groundbreaking as soon as possible.

Baltimore's Thomas Viaduct Celebrates 175th on July 5th

An exhibit of historic and current images of the Thomas Viaduct will run through February 2011 and is available for viewing on most days during regular Baltimore Museum hours. The exhibit features drawings, paintings, and photographs; plus 3D models of a Thomas Viaduct passenger pavilion and observation shelter by Morgan State University architecture students. Call in advance for status at 410-752-2462, Ext. 215.

The Thomas Viaduct spans the Patapsco River and Patapsco Valley between Relay and Elkridge, Maryland, USA. It is the first multi-span masonry railroad bridge in the United States to be built on a curve. Construction of the bridge commenced on July 4, 1833, and was completed on July 4, 1835.

The Thomas Viaduct was the largest bridge in the nation in its day and today it remains the world's largest bridge of its kind, as well as the world's oldest multiple arched stone railroad bridge. It was named for Philip E. Thomas, the first president of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad (B&O). Until after the American Civil War, the B&O was the only railroad into Washington, thus the Thomas Viaduct was essential for supply trains to reach the capital of the Union during that conflict. To prevent sabotage, the bridge was heavily guarded by Union troops stationed along its length. The viaduct is now owned and operated by CSX Transportation and still in use today. making it one of the oldest railroad bridges still in service.



This Roman-arch stone bridge is divided into eight spans, designed by Benjamin Henry Latrobe, II, then B&O's assistant engineer. The main design problem to overcome was that of constructing such a large bridge on a curve. The design called for several variations in span and pier widths between the opposite sides of the structure. This problem was solved by having the lateral pier faces laid out on radial lines making the piers essentially wedge-shaped and fitted to the 4 degree curve.

The span of the viaduct is 612 ft long; the individual arches are roughly 58 ft in span, with a height of 59 ft from the water level to the base of the rail. The width at the top of the spandrel wall copings is 26 ft, 4 in. The bridge is constructed using rough-dressed Maryland granite ashlar from Patapsco River quarries. A wooden floored walkway built for pedestrian and railway employee use is four feet wide and supported by cast iron brackets and edged with ornamental cast iron railings. The viaduct contains 24,476 cubic yards of masonry and cost \$142,236.51 (an estimated \$2,769,917.36 in 2007 dollars).

During the 1880s–1950s, Thomas Viaduct carried B&O's famed Royal Blue Line passenger trains between New York and Washington, and, until the late 1960s, B&O passenger trains to points west of Washington, such as the Capital Limited to Chicago and the National Limited to St. Louis. In 1986, CSX acquired the B&O and all of its trackage including the Thomas Viaduct. With the advent of Amtrak on May 1, 1971, all B&O passenger train service was discontinued, except for local Baltimore-Washington commuter trains, which continue to operate on a daily basis over Thomas Viaduct as MARC's "Camden Line" train service under contract with CSX Transportation.

Driving directions to the viaduct: From Baltimore, take I-95 south Take the I-195 exit towards the BWI airport (east). Take Route 1 south. Turn right at the first light on Levering Ave.

Travel until you pass under a large stone arch, that's the viaduct.

These kits are the PRR X29D 40' box and SAL 38' ventilated box with flat panel/riveted ends. The PRR box has never been produced in S, except possibly in brass but I don't have that history. The SAL box, "for sure" never produced in S, is similar to the CG vent box I produced a couple years ago. The main differences are roof, ends and length (SAL is 2 feet shorter). Target prices for each will be \$70 including decals and couplers, less trucks. The "usual" 1-pc resin body, separate underframe and a sheet
